The Age of Exploration PowerPoint Project

Procedure:

- 1. Each student will pick a number from a box and pick his/her topic in order.
- 2. Chose an important historical figure from the list provided.
- 3. Find you topic in your text book, read about his/her accomplishments and take notes on your topic.
- 4. Compare your notes to the list of achievements worksheet.
- 5. From the achievement worksheet, choose the best possible match from the list.
- 6. Write down your topic's main achievement.
- 7. Open a PowerPoint presentation and create: a title slide, your main idea slide and your main achievement slide.
- 8. Continue to add slides and the information you gathered from your text book. Be sure to complete a citation on your works cited slide.
- 9. Go to World Book on line.
- 10. Read, copy and paste further details about your topic into PowerPoint "Notes" section.
- 11. Be sure to copy and paste no more than one paragraph per slide.
- 12. Read your notes from each slide and put the important details in your own words in a bulleted list.
- 13. In the Notes section re-write the information that you pasted into your presentation.
- 14. While on World Book, copy and paste any visuals that you want to use to individual slides. (Be sure to include any maps) Be sure to copy and paste the citation information on your works cited slide.
- 15. Go to google.com and click on the images tab. Copy and paste any images that you might find useful to your PowerPoint presentation. Be sure to copy the URL for each image and paste it on the slide with your image and copy to your works cited slide.
- 16. If time allows, continue to search the web and add information about your topic.
- 17. Complete your "Works Cited" slide to include the sources of your information.
